We reaffirm our commitment to protect the human rights of migrant children, given their vulnerability, particularly unaccompanied migrant children, and to provide for their health,

We reaffirm that remittance flows constitute sources of private capital and are instrumental in improving the well-being of recipients, but cannot be equated to foreign direct investment, official development assistance, or other public sources of financing for development. We commit to further address and promote conditions for cheaper, faster and safer transfers of remittances in both source and recipient countries. In line with the Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Sustainable Development Goals, by 2030 we will work towards reducing the average transaction cost of migrant remittances to less than 10 per cent and we will ensure that no remittance corridor requires charges higher than 5 per cent.

3.16 We strongly encourage cooperation between, on the one hand, countries of origin or nationality and, on the other, countries of destination and other relevant countries in ensuring that migrants who do not meet the criteria for staying in the latter can return to their country of origin or nationality in a safe, orderly and dignified manner. Any type of return, whether voluntary or otherwise, must be consistent with international human rights standards. It must also respect the rules of international law and must in addition be in keeping with the best interests of children and with due process. We support enhanced reception and reintegration assistance for those who are returned.

We note in this respect that the Third High Level Dialogue on International Migration and Development is to be held at AB EF in New York "by no later than 2, 1 . and that a role could be envisaged for the ECD within the process. We expect that the International Organization for Migration would provide support for the negotiations. The Global Forum for Migration and Development and the Global Migration Group might also make contributions and in addition we encourage regional consultations in support of the negotiations.
