I. Introduction

On 7 October 2016, the Peacebuilding Commission convened an expert-level meeting on

The purpose of the meeting was to initiate a conversation within the Commission on what lessons can be drawn from peacebuilding experiences in countries in transition, including the early PBC engagements in Burundi and Sierra Leone, as well as in Timor-Leste.
